# What is Epiphany?

Just when you thought the holidays were over, surprise — they're not! Christmas officially kicks off on December 25 and lasts until January 6, when Christians worldwide celebrate Epiphany. This day, also called "Three Kings Day," marks the visit of the Magi (or wise men) to the baby Jesus. The word "Epiphany" comes from the Greek word for "manifestation," referring to Jesus being revealed as the Son of God.



The story, found in the book of Matthew, tells of three kings following a star in the East to find the baby in the manger, bearing gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Bonus points if you can name the kings: Melchior, Caspar, and Balthazar.

And for extra credit — myrrh is a scented oil!

Epiphany has been celebrated as a church feast since the second century, making it one of Christianity's oldest traditions.

### **How Is Epiphany Celebrated?**

Celebrations vary depending on where you are and your denomination.

Protestants in the U.S. usually mark Epiphany on the Sunday closest to January 6 with a church service, signaling the start of the "season of Epiphany." This season, focusing on Jesus' miracles, continues until the Sunday before Ash Wednesday (this year, March 1). Catholics celebrate Epiphany on January 6. The day includes Pope Francis' homily during Mass at St. Peter's Basilica. On the following Sunday, Catholic priests often focus on Jesus' baptism in their homilies. Eastern Orthodox Christians emphasize Jesus' baptism as well, with unique traditions like priests tossing crosses into icy waters for devotees to retrieve. Orthodox churches using a different liturgical calendar celebrate Epiphany on January 19, saving their plunge for then.

# Are There Other Traditions for Epiphany?

Absolutely! Not everyone celebrates by diving into freezing water!

In **Spain**, children leave their shoes outside on Epiphany Eve, hoping for candy and presents (if they've been good). Naughty kids? They get lumps of coal.

In **Italy**, a beloved figure known as *La Befana*, a "good witch," leaves gifts for children. Legend says the Magi invited her to join their search for Jesus, but she was too



busy. Regretting her decision, she now flies through the air delivering gifts while searching for the Christ child. Even Venetian gondoliers join the fun, dressing as La Befana and cruising the Grand Canal.

In **Latin America** and Spain, families bake a *roscon de reyes* or king's ring cake. A figurine of a baby is hidden in the dough, symbolizing Jesus being revealed to the Magi. Whoever finds the baby in their slice gets to host the next celebration!

In **New Orleans**, the tradition of king cake has taken on a Mardi Gras twist. These festive, frosted, and often fruit-filled cakes include a hidden plastic baby, eaten throughout the Epiphany season right up to Ash Wednesday.

Epiphany may be one of the lesser-known holidays in the U.S., but its rich traditions around the world remind us of the joy and wonder of the season. Wherever and however you celebrate, it's a time to reflect on the revelation of Christ to the world — and perhaps enjoy a slice of king cake while you're at it!

Choir practice is on Wednesdays at 6:30 p.m. Now is the time to join if you would like to be a part of our new blended worship service. For more info,


